'Rikki-tikki-tavi' is a famous mongoose character by Rudyard Kipling

 Of the 34 species of Mongoose found across the world, 6 are found in India

They are small and slender but full of energy

 They are omnivores – feed on both plants and animals for their food

 They are known for their ability to fight and kill venemous snakes, particularly cobras


Brown Mongoose (Herpestes fuscus Waterhouse)










#### Killing for art ???



#### Mongoose under threat! Why?

 Mongoose is poached primarily for its meat and 'hair'

- Mongoose hair is used for making paint brushes
- Mongoose is trapped and invariably beaten to death so that its hair can be extracted
- For a kilogramme of hair at least 40 to 50 mongoose are killed
- Each mongoose yields about 40 gm of hair but when the hair is sorted, only 20 – 25 gm of hair is found usable for making paint brushes



#### How can we identify mongoose hair brush ???

The hair is about 3 to 7 cm long and coarse

The hair is **streaked** or typically banded with black & white or brown & cream colours



The hair is **stiff but feels soft** when rubbed against hand or palm.

Natural hair appears matte compared to imitations/artificial brushes. They appear glossy due to nylon content in it

#### Few more identification tips ...








Mongoose hair have a salt 'n' pepper pattern and can be in darker or lighter shades. The hair does not shine much against light and retains its shape quickly even when fully bent.

Burn a few hair of the brush. If it smells of burnt hair, then it can be a suspected mongoose hair brush. If it smells of plastic burning, then it is a synthetic brush

TO STAY OUT OF JAIL.

Possession of mongoose hair brushes is a punishable offence under the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 with imprisonment up to 7 years.

#### Its Punishable ...

Mongoose are protected under Part II Schedule-II of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 (in India).

Hunting, possession, transportation and trade of mongoose and its articles is an offence punishable with *imprisonment* up to seven years.

#### WCCB's "Operation Clean Art"

- Under 'Operation Clean Art' on 24<sup>th</sup> of Nov 2019, WCCB coordinated country-wide raids to crackdown on the illegal trade in Mongoose hair brush,
- Raids were coordinated in number of places including various factories and shops involved in illegal manufacturing and trade of brushes
- More than 50,000 brushes and 113 Kg of hair from across India was seized in a joint operation by WCCB, State Forest and Police departments





#### Let's take a pledge!!

- We will not buy brushes made from mongoose hair
- We will make others aware that they too should not use mongoose hair brushes
- If we find mongoose hair brushes, being used or sold in our locality, we will inform our Teachers, State Forest Department or Wildlife Crime Control Bureau
